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Tawasul launches website on Majlis A'Shura polls

Khalid al Haribi, managing director of Tawasul, said, "We

made use of Sablat Oman's experiences in designing the website. Besides the main link to the Sablat Oman forum, the website also has links to other social media websites like Twitter and Facebook. We did our best to make the issue of elections and

politics more attractive. We also tried to encourage people to elect women by stressing that they are an important part of the country's development."

Haribi said that Tawasul will organise two seminars to promote the elections on September

18 in Muscat and September 21 in Salalah. "About 150 candidates have already submitted their resumes to the website."

Referring to some calls recently for boycotting the elections, Farei said, "They reflect a negative attitude. It is time to take the lead and choose the best candidate instead of boycotting the elections."

Khalid al Balushi, a Sablat Oman administrator, said, "The website has a team of 50 volunteers who are in charge of updating the content. There is also a group, with members from Tawasul and Sablat Oman, which will monitor the website around the clock."

Noora Abdulrahman al Zadjali, an election candidate, said, "A large number of voters still stay away from voting, which is a challenge that needs to be addressed by everyone."
